School Funding

Dear Parents,

I have written in the past about the funding schools receive and the impact the lack of money is having across the education sector. Hampshire is one of the worse funded local authorities in the country. As a county we receive money for every child and Hampshire receives over £3,000 per child less than the highest funded local authority. To put it in real terms if we were in the highest funded authority, as a school we would receive £590,000 more than we do now almost doubling our budget. Between 2012, when I started as Headteacher, and now our budget has fallen by £56,000 the equivalent of two additional teachers, this does not include the increase in costs such as national insurance and pension rises and inflation. During this time we have continued to improve and our results have continued to rise. However many schools are under serious pressure. Across the country schools have faced real term cuts of 8% according to the Institute of Fiscal Studies. Next Friday I will be representing our school by traveling to London with around 1000 Head teacher's across the country to take a letter to Downing Street to ask the government to look seriously at how they invest in the future of our country. There is no political motive, this is not about increased pay or improved working conditions this is about schools saying please provide the funds we need to be able to give the very best to the children in our care. I hope you feel as we do as a school, that such an important matter has to be raised in a high profile way and we have to fight for the needs of all children not just those in our own school.
