New half term topics

You will have received or will be receiving shortly a leaflet from your child's class about the new topics that they are learning about this half term. On those leaflets are also some ideas for work you could do at home with your child. Any research online, from books or through first hand experiences can really encourage your child's enthusiasm for the work they are doing at school.

Year R

In Year R we are focusing on being 'Animal Detectives' linking Science, RE and Design Technology. All the children will have an opportunity to investigate dinosaurs, visit the vets or explore a jungle through our exciting role play areas. They will also look at all kinds of animals that come from eggs as a link to new life and Easter.

Year 1

Year 1 are travelling back in time to the Victorian era. Based around their visit to the Weald and Downland Museum, Year 1 will be comparing houses in the past with houses in the present. They will also be making 3D houses using a variety of joining techniques.

Year 2

Year 2's topic is Night Time Explorers. We will have our own Night Time Explorers Evening next week and then a trip to Marwell Zoo to finish the topic. The children will find out about nocturnal animals and decide (through research) whether the best habitat for them to live in would be London or Bordon.
