As long as school is open children will be expected to be in school even if siblings at other schools are off due to the strike action.

Next week there will be some repair work to fix the big dip in the floor around one section of the Pirate Ship. The ship will be out of action until the repairs are complete. Please do not let your children play on the Pirate Ship before or after school while repair work is going on. Thank you

I hope that the new spelling sheets we have been sending out have helped you to support your child learning their spellings better. Spellings at this young age is a very fine line to walk. The most important thing for young children learning to write is having the confidence to write. Most of the children will spell words phonetically, exactly how they sound, so often 'was' becomes 'wos'. How and when we start correcting these mistakes depends very much on the individual child. For many words we don't correct children as the quality of the language they use is more important at this stage than spelling the word correctly. For more frequently used words like 'was' we will correct at the appropriate point in their learning. Your support in helping your child to learn the words or the sounds we are sending home is vital in helping your child to succeed. The English language is very complex and children need a lot of practice at learning words that logically do not make much sense.
