As a school we want to ensure that the information you receive about your child is useful and is the type of information you want. End of year reports are done in many different ways by schools and as a school we have changed and adapted the reports we send to you a few times over the last couple of years.

We are starting to look at our reports for this year and we would like your input. Attached to this week's newsletter is a sheet with two different report formats on. Both report formats contain the same information they just present it in different ways. We would like to know which style of report you prefer.

These report formats are for years 1 and 2. As Year R is a different curriculum with different reporting requirements their reports will be by necessity, different.

If you could have a look at the two different formats over the Easter holidays and return the reply slip to us we can make a decision as to which one we use. The reports are primarily for you as parents so it is important that we are giving you the information you want in the way that you want it.

Report style 1

Literacy

Matthew is reading at a very high level and is now off the Read Write Inc. reading scheme. He has the ability to discuss what he has read confidently. He can use a variety of strategies to read unfamiliar words and is able to read aloud with increasing accuracy and expression.

Matthew can write to a very high quality in fiction and non-fiction writing. He is beginning to organise and group his ideas into logical sections and is able to use some great vocabulary to make his writing interesting and engaging for his reader. In non-fiction writing Matthew uses knowledge gained from his reading to support his written work and is using appropriate structures to present information. His handwriting, in particular the correct and clear formation and positioning of letters, are areas Matthew now needs to work as well as using appropriate punctuation consistently and independently.

Matthew participates generally and contributes well during our speaking and listening sessions when he focuses. He can speak clearly in small groups and is beginning to listen more carefully, responding appropriately.
