Year R

Year R are basing all their learning around Pirates this term. Temporary Classroom Going

The week beginning the 4th May builders will arrive and start the process of removing the temporary classroom from the playground. This should take about a week to complete. The builders will put fencing up around the site they are working and will create their own entrance into their compound from Budds Lane. While the children will no doubt find the process fascinating there will be no way the children can get from our playground into the builders compound. The company doing the work is the same company that installed the classroom, so they know the school and the site very well. The company do a huge amount of this type of work for Hampshire and the health and safety of the children is always their top concern.

ASTHMA

Asthma is a common and chronic condition of the airways. Airways become narrow and inflamed due to 'triggers'. The reactions are usually reversible.



Symptoms of poorly controlled asthma include: coughing, particularly at night; increased use of blue preventer; Chest tightness and breathlessness; unable to fully enjoy day to day activities.

Tips for managing your asthma well

- Know your triggers and avoid them
- Take your preventer medication as prescribed
- Get your asthma reviewed regularly at your GP surgery with the Practice Nurse.
- Always use a spacer to take your medication.
- Take one puff at a time, and breathe steadily through the spacer 4 times.
- Always shake the inhaler between each puff.
- Avoid smoking and smoky environments

In 2011 18 children aged under 14 years died from asthma, and with on average 1 admission to hospital every 21 minutes. Most asthma deaths can be prevented by better management. www.asthma.org.uk

Holidays in School Time

Last term we sent out a letter from Hampshire County Council informing parents of the change in the Counties procedures for parents taking children out of school in term time. The procedures are that if your child is out of school for any reason other than genuine illness for five or more days in a term you will be automatically fined.

We are still receiving requests for holidays from parents and while we appreciate every family has unique reasons for wanting a holiday during term time the school has **no flexibility** to grant this. Please bear this in mind if you are booking a holiday. As a school we do not want any parent to get fined. A fine for a five day holiday for two children will cost £240 and could involve the parents being taken to court.

Unwell Children

If children are a little under the weather and a dose of Calpol will pick them up then do send them into school.

If children are physically sick twice or more or have an upset stomach then they need to stay off school for 48 hours after the sickness has ended. This is to ensure they are no longer contagious and do not pass the illness on to others.

If your child is too ill to attend school please phone the school office in the morning to let us know and leave a message. If we have not had a phone call we will phone you to confirm why they are not at school.
