Democracy

UN CRC Article 12: Children have the right to say what they think should happen, when adults are making decisions that affect them, and to have their opinions taken into account.

All the children in our school are members of a family **group and siblings** are kept together. They grow with their group throughout their time with us and this enables them to have their voices heard and be at the centre of the decision making process. Our school community includes Governors, children, teachers and parents are all are involved in decision making processes where possible.

The Rule of Law

UN CRC Article 19: Governments should ensure that children are properly cared for, and Protect them from violence, abuse and neglect by their parents, or anyone else who looks after them.

and behaviour management. Children have the opportunity to learn about the reasons behind the laws that are there to govern and protect us and the consequences when they are broken.
