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## **End of School Year and Arrangements for September**

Dear Parents,

Well it certainly has been a very difficult year for all of us. The one thing that I am so pleased about is that the children appear happy and settled. I think we can give ourselves a pat on the back as parents and school that we have done well by them throughout this period.

I just wanted to give you an update on our plans for next year. I am hoping that restrictions will be relaxed further as we go through the year and much of this will be able to be changed. For now, most of it will stay the same as it currently is. There will be no coming to the classroom doors for parents in the morning or evening, no assemblies and no events where parents are invited into school. We will continue to have additional hand washing and additional cleaning.

These are some of the things that will be different.

- We would like all Year 1 and 2 parents to send children in with a named pencil case so they can have their own equipment in it. The pencil case should be empty, we will provide the equipment they need.
- We will be actively promoting and teaching the children the 'Catch it, Bin it, Kill it' idea when blowing their nose and sneezing.
- We will split the playground in half so that Year 1 and Year 2 play in different areas.
- We cannot separate Year R, 1 and 2 completely at lunchtime but we will have all Year R and one Year 1 class in first and then the other Year 1 class and Year 2 in second. This will be consistent every day.
- We will start sending home reading books and other work such as phonics and spellings.

The biggest issue is we need to slightly change the start and finish times for each year group. This is to reduce the number of people coming to the school at any one time. The new times are:

Year R - 8:40 to 3:10

Year 1 - 8:45 to 3:15

Year 2 - 8:55 to 3:25

These are temporary times and as soon as we can go back to normal we will do. Please remember we have Breakfast Club or After School Club if you need. I am sorry but we cannot make any exceptions for individual cases as if I made an exception for one family I would have to do it for everyone.

I hope you all get the chance to have a break and spend time with the children over the summer. I will look forward to seeing all of you in September, including our lovely Year 2's who will be moving to the Juniors.
